"Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" Exodus 20: 8.

Most Christians and Jews believe that the Ten Commandments given to Moses are key commands for people of faith to follow. Over the centuries Christians have interpreted and observed this fourth commandment in very different ways. As a young boy in the early 1950's I remember that Sundays were tied to the PA Blue Laws which mandated that all stores be closed. There were no school athletic events and not much of anything held on a Sunday. Even farmers would schedule crop harvests to avoid Sundays and only necessary farm chores were tended to. Sunday was understood as a day to observe religious activities with church attendance being central. Some groups were very strict about personal observance of 'the Sabbath'. Doing 'fun' things was not allowed. Orthodox Jews still hold to a very strict view about work that is forbidden. But for most Christians today in our society, Sunday is only special in the sense that it is a part of the weekend and a great day to do whatever one might want to do.

Unfortunately, for many of us, we are finding a lot of things to do besides going to church on Sunday morning. Protestants and Catholic churches are experiencing diminished congregations in part because we are pulled in so many directions on any given Sunday morning. Our own attendance has on some recent Sundays become dangerously slim. Worship services need a critical mass in order to function. There are legitimate demands that take us away from church on Sundays; but if we do not make church attendance a priority, the church will be seriously impaired. Jesus delivered us from a severely strict interpretation of the Sabbath, but he never said we should ignore the commandment. At the least, honoring the command means making Sunday morning church attendance a priority. Our participation encouraged others and, in the end, it may have something to do with our survival.




